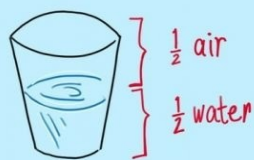

National Night Out (NNO) day is sponsored by the National Association of Town Watch, in partnership with the US Department of Justice. The program is designed to:

- Heighten crime, drug and violence prevention awareness.
- Generate support for, and participate in, local anticrime programs.
- Strength neighborhood spirit and police-community partnerships.
- Send a message to criminals letting them know that neighborhoods are organized

and fighting back.

Along with the traditional display of outdoor lights and front porch vigils, cities, towns and neighborhoods 'celebrate' NNO with a variety of events and activities such as:

- block parties,
- cookouts,
- visits from local police and sheriff departments,
- parades, exhibits,
- flashlight walks,
- contests, and youth programs.

NNO has proven to be an effective, inexpensive and enjoyable program to promote

neighborhood spirit and police-community partnerships in our fight for a safer nation.

Registration is free, and registrants will receive a how-to kit complete with ideas, tips, guidelines and promotional materials. You will also be placed on their email list and will receive updates and additional information.

## National Kids Day

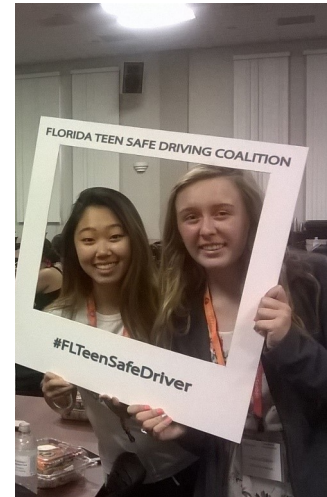
Research shows that the #1 influence on the behavior of teens is the input that they receive from their parents.

- Sponsor an information booth or campaign that week educating others about the dangers of running a red light.

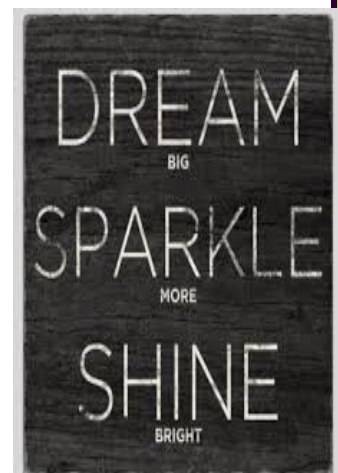

## Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over —Aug. 19-Sept. 7, 2015

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's (NHTSA) "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" national crackdown will be a combined DUI enforcement and public awareness campaign.

The agency is targeting the campaign at males in the 18-34 demographic, which account for the majority of alcohol-related crashes.

The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) Safety Office is coordinating the campaign in Florida.

For ways that you and your SADD chapter can get involved:

- ◆ Go to the SADD National site to download their [SADD & the Law](#) program guide: .
- ◆ Invite a local law enforcement officer to make a presentation on what the law enforcement agency is doing during the crackdown.
- ◆ Create signs/posters and display them around your campus.
- ◆ Use the school's PA system to remind students not to ride with an impaired driver.
- ◆ Write a Letter to the Editor of your local newspaper supporting the La-

bor Day National Crackdown.

(FDOT) campaign reached more than 40.3 million people. The campaign focuses on helping drivers understand the risks associated with distracted driving, notifying and educating the public about the ban on texting and driving

in Florida and ultimately helping to keep our roadways safer.

## SADD Membership Drive

At the start of the new school year there is a scramble of activities, each requiring your undivided attention. As you start planning for your SADD chapter you might want to consider doing the following things:

### 1. Activity Mystery Box

- ♦ Find a large box.
- ♦ Have one (or more) of your SADD chapter officers/ members decorate it specifically for SADD.
- ♦ Put the box within easy reach of your desk.
- ♦ Once you get an email from FL SADD, have someone write the suggested activity titles on a slip of paper and put them into the box.
- ♦ Each member or sub committee can randomly select a paper from the box and that will become their task for the week or month.

### 2. Chapter Announcements

- ♦ Have a group of SADD chapter students create an An-

nouncement Board for your classroom.

- ♦ At your first meeting, form a committee to be responsible for updating and maintaining the Announcement Board.
- ♦ Make daily announcements or regular PSA's over your school's PA system
- ♦ Make announcements or PSA's during sporting events

### 3. Chapter Calendar

- ♦ At your first meeting, get volunteers to take responsibility for the Chapter Calendar.
- ♦ Download FL SADD [activity guides](#) to help decide what to put on your calendar. Have the volunteers personalize it for your chapter/ school.
- ♦ Select dates based upon the monthly FL SADD Activity Guides, and also include birthdays, school events, town events, etc.
- ♦ Have them decorate it for your chapter.
- ♦ Make sure that the calendar is posted on the Announcement Board at all times.
- ♦ Share the calendar

with other school chapters, teachers, parents, and administration.

### 4. Meeting Announcements

- ♦ Make creative meeting announcements.
- ♦ Insert your school name, chapter name, advisor name, meeting time/location, etc. to personalize it specifically for your chapter.
- ♦ Distribute as needed (in mailbox of each teacher, as flyers for parents, as flyers to hang on walls, etc.).
- ♦ The FL SADD posters coming to you soon will include white space at the bottom/right for you to use as a place to market your chapter meetings and activities.

### 5. Delegate

- ♦ Some of our most successful chapters are those that are student run. Good news for you teachers who already have so much to do! But, in order for your students to run the chapter successfully, you will need to delegate jobs and

to keep an eye out that the jobs are being completed.

- ◆ Form committees for each project.
- ◆ Give each member of the chapter something to be responsible for.
- ◆ Keep each job small, do-able, and with specific deadline dates.
- ◆ Reward completed jobs (student of the month, most improved, etc.).
- ◆ Have everyone report to your chapter officers, and have your officers report to you.
- ◆ Involve parents, other teachers, chapters, and administration.
- ◆ Advertise your success!
- ◆ Meet regularly (same day, time, location).
- ◆ Post meeting signs at least one week prior to each meeting.
- ◆ Announce meeting times over morning PA.

## 6. SADD Chapter Materials

- ◆ The [FL SADD Chapter Manual](#) was created to help you with your chapter. It includes forms, chapter activities,

descriptions of SADD ideals and philosophy, sample by-laws, officer job descriptions, and suggestions on running successful chapter meetings.

- ◆ Make a copy of the [FL SADD manual](#) for each chapter officer and have them present the contents at a chapter meeting.
- ◆ Use the sample by-laws to create by-laws for your own chapter as well as for your chapter officers.
- ◆ Create a SADD chapter manual for your own chapter by using the state one as a model.

## 7. SRO

- ◆ Almost every school has a SRO – School Resource Officer. S/he may already be the chapter advisor, but if not, then s/he is an extremely valuable resource for your chapter. This person can get you contact information to use for chapter activities, may be able to provide you with literature and/or give-away items, and can help you

plan your Mock Crash/Prom. Invite him/her to be on your chapter planning committee and include them at every meeting.

- ◆ Invite the SROs from schools in your area to attend an information meeting about you and SADD
- ◆ Host a coffee/donut sale and use the proceeds to purchase an award or thank you gift for your SRO

## 8. Facebook Pages

- ◆ If you have a FB page for your chapter, please post that on the Florida SADD FB page so that we can “like” it and share in your success stories.
- ◆ Be sure to “like” the [Florida SADD](#) and [SADD National](#) FB pages because there are daily postings on those sites that cannot be sent through your school’s IT filter systems.

## 9. Web Pages

- ◆ Be sure to visit the [Florida SADD](#) and [SADD National](#) web pages for activity ideas, manuals, and links to other resources, conference news, and other up-

dated information.

### 10. Have fun!

- ♦ Fun and a sense of pride, accomplishment, and inclusion are the things that SADD chapter members report back to me as the most important aspects of their chapter. Include social and fun activities as part of your regular meetings.
- ♦ Donut sales – ask your local donut shop to sell your chapter donuts at a discount price, and then sell them to students on their way out of school. It's a way to raise some money and for your chapter members to have some fun.
- ♦ Coffee-Club – ask parents to sign up to chaperone a regular Friday night coffee-club at the local Border's or Barnes and Nobles bookstore. Your chapter members could meet there for a social activity without worrying about dates.

### 11. Improvise

- ♦ Engage your chapter members in brainstorming sessions to come up with other ideas.
- ♦ Seek out a SADD chapter in nearby school and do a combined project.
- ♦ Post your ideas on our Florida SADD FB page and/or send them to the state coordinator.

Teen crashes continue to be a major problem on our roads. The number one reason for these crashes is lack of experience, so it is critical that we follow our GDL (Graduated Driving License) laws; in fact, states with the strongest GDL laws have fewer teen crashes than states with laws that are more lenient (like Florida).

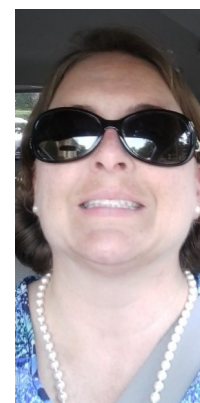
